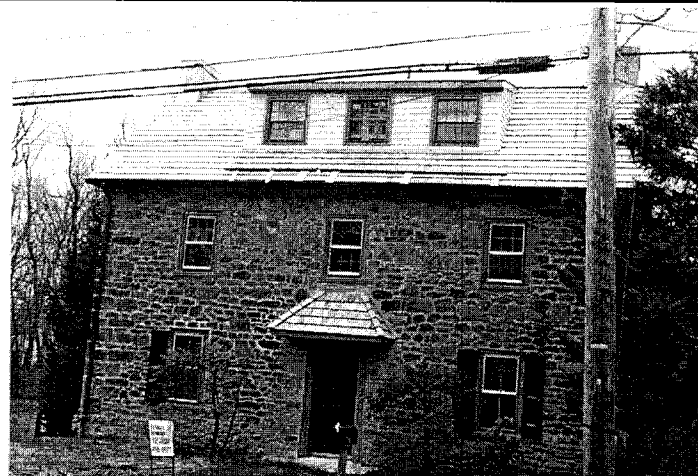

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION:

This Vernacular, 2.5-story stone farmhouse consists of a core facing Skippack Pike, an addition attached to the rear (originally creating an ell-shape), and a newer addition within the void of the ell. The property also has a medium sized stone barn in the rear of the property.

The core, constructed in 1810 (date stone - north end), has two main stories and a third served by a single, three windowed, monitor-style dormer facing Skippack Pike. (The wood shingle roof is new - the house may have had individual dormers at one time.) There are two flush, stucco-covered chimneys at each end. The walls are dark colored un-coursed fieldstone with large quoins. Fenestration consists of three bays of windows containing newer, 2x2 sash windows on the first floor and 6x6 sashes on the second floor. The main entrance is centered between the first floor windows and protected by a wood shingled, hip roof. A transom is located over the door. The core measures $\approx 30' \times 15'$.

The older addition is 2.5 stories, facing the side street. Notable features are its stone fieldstone walls, single hip roofed dormer, and wood shingle roof. There is also a single story, stucco covered addition in the void of the ell. With the additions, the house measures approximately $30' \times 40'$.

Associated Building: (Barn) Like many resources along Skippack Pike, this property includes a barn. However, the barn, unlike most barns in the Township, is stone. The 2-story, partially stucco clad stone barn has an end gabled, asphalt shingle roof. Its main wall, facing the side street, has just one window. A 2-story, centered entrance, located under a small cross gable above, is the building's most heavily altered feature, yet the alteration has not undermined the overall architectural significance of the structure. This entrance is accessed between two stone pillars near the street.

Classification: The house is in excellent condition. Its shape and particular use of stone are rare in the Township. Class I.

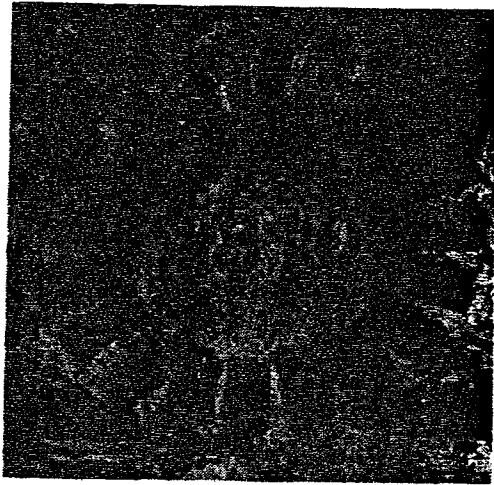

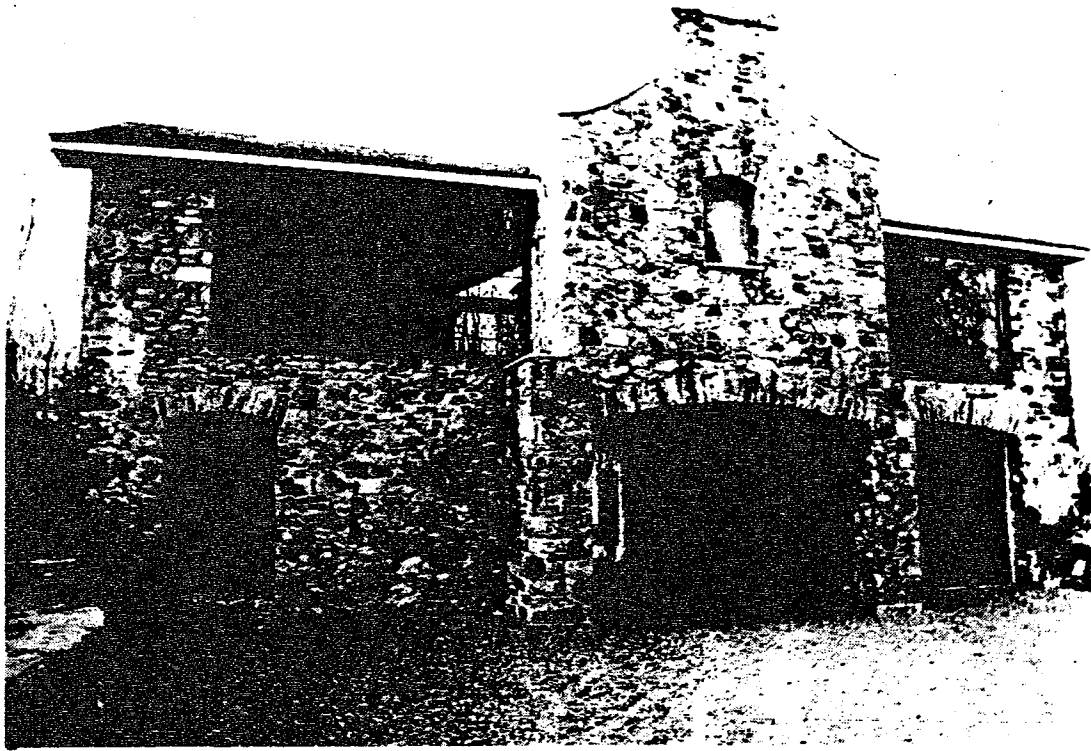
This property, located on the corner of Skippack Pike and Cathcart Road, owned by Peter Cross, was named after Mr. Cross' great, great uncle, Clement C. Moore, who wrote "The Night Before Christmas."

In the early days Abraham Wentz, who owned and operated the red brick inn across Cathcart Road, also owned this property and used it for the "overflow" of overnight travelers to the inn. In 1871, the executors of the estate of Abraham Wentz, who died in 1870, sold the home and eleven acres to William H. Seeley for \$2,400.

Caroline S. Hangstorfer came here as an eighteen-year-old bride in 1884 and the home remained in the possession of the Hangstorfer family until 1965. Fred Hangstorfer, son of Caroline, was known for disposing of dead animals for the farmers in this area. Cathcart Road was at one time called Hangstorfer Road.

Peter Cross, who purchased the property in 1965, stated that he has seen an original deed of this property dated 1755. Part of this house was a toll house during the time of the Skippack Turnpike Company which was dissolved in 1901. Mr. Cross made additions to the original house and remodeled the barn; old bricks from walkways around the outside have been used in the present kitchen floor and many old window panes remain in the "old part" of the house.
