

Project Background

- ✓ Design Public Meeting December 2002.
- ✓ Offline Intersection Public Meeting September 2003.

Project Limits

- ✓ This section begins just south of Johnson Highway and extends to south of Morris Road (4.3 miles).
Two Construction Sections
- ✓ Construction Section 61N - North of Township Line Road (includes Township Line off line intersections).
- ✓ Construction Section 61S - South of Township Line Road.

Roadway Features

- ✓ 4-lane curbed roadway with 5-foot bicycle lanes from Johnson Highway to Township Line Road.
- ✓ 5-lane curbed roadway with 5-foot bicycle lanes from Swede Road to Morris Road.
- ✓ Minor improvements to Johnson Highway, Germantown Pike, Dekalb Blvd., Swede Road, Yost Road, Jolly Road and Skippack Pike.
- ✓ Relocation of the Mews at Blue Bell Access Road.
- ✓ Offline intersection improvements at Township Line Road and North Wales Road.
- ✓ Offline intersection at Township Line Road and Arch Road.

Bridge/Structural Features

- ✓ Replace eight culverts or bridges in the project limits.
- ✓ Sound barriers proposed at Southwest corner of US 202 and Johnson Highway, US 202 south of Township Line Road (Southbound), and US 202 between Yost Road and Jolly Road (Northbound).



- ✓ Construction Section 61N anticipated Summer 2017 with a 2 year construction period. Estimated Cost \$48* Million. (*2017 \$\$)
- ✓ Construction Section 61S anticipated Spring 2019 with a 2-year construction period.*Estimated Cost \$42** Million. (**2019 \$\$)

Section 65S

Project Limits

- ✓ This section extends along DeKalb Pike from just south of Morris Rd. to south of Hancock Rd. (2.7 miles).

Roadway Features

- ✓ 5-lane curbed roadway with 5-foot bicycle lanes.
- ✓ 4-lane roadway with raised concrete median and 8-foot shoulders from Grasshopper Lane to Schoolhouse Rd.
- ✓ Minor improvements to Morris Rd., Sumneytown Pike and Swedesford Rd.
- ✓ Redesign of Plymouth Rd. stop control intersection.
- ✓ Incorporated shift in roadway alignment through Gwynedd Corners to reduce impacts to Friends Meetinghouse.

Traffic Improvements

- ✓ Traffic signal improvements at Morris Rd., Township Line Rd., Schoolhouse Ln. and Sumneytown Pk.
- ✓ Flashing beacon installation at Meetinghouse Road.
- ✓ ITS Elements

Bridge/Structural Features

- ✓ Replace existing bridge at Wissahickon Creek with wider single-span structure and equestrian path beneath roadway.
- ✓ Retaining walls south of Grasshopper Lane and south of Wissahickon Creek Bridge.
- ✓ Sound barriers along DeKalb Pike south and north of Plymouth Rd., and south of Swedesford Rd.

Project Status

- ✓ Ongoing Final Design Efforts.
- ✓ Continual coordination with residents and townships.
- ✓ Construction targeted for spring of 2019, with a two (2) year construction period.
- ✓ Estimated construction cost is \$60.7* million. (*2019 \$\$)

Section 65N

- ✓ 5-lane curbed roadway with 5-foot bicycle lanes.
- ✓ Section of Dekalb Pike north of Hancock Road to Bethlehem Pike with connection to US 202 Parkway.
- ✓ Includes Welsh Road widening from Stump Road through Dekalb Pike.
- ✓ Construction completed and roadway open to traffic.

Offline Improvements

- ✓ Relocation of Meetinghouse Road intersection with Dekalb Pike
- ✓ Improvements at five (5) locations along Evans Road including adding left turn lanes at Sumneytown Pike
- ✓ Construction completed spring of 2012.
